### **International Surveys**

The Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC), now being carried out in Canada and in many other countries, is the follow-up to the <u>Adult Literacy and Life Skills Survey</u> (ALLS, 2003). Like its predecessors, ALLs and IALS (International Literacy Survey, 1994), it is being coordinated by the <u>Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD)</u>. In addition to prose and document literacy (now merged into one category) numeracy and problem-solving, this survey measures Problem Solving in Technology-Rich Environments (PS-TRE), which is how people solve the types of problems they encounter when using information and communication technologies. Results from PIAAC are expected in 2013. Twenty-seven countries, including Canada, are participating.

Eighteen sociology students at Mount Alison University worked with the Tantramar Family Resource Centre (TFRC) of Sackville, New Brunswick, to create a research project looking at the ways in which families experience and define literacy, their use of literacy resources, and ways in which community literacy services could better serve their needs. The researchers completed a literature review on family literacy before interviewing seven lower-income local parents and seven service providers. The report describes the research and the findings. It includes recommendations to make literacy programs more accessible to lower-income families, including flexible hours, childcare, and help with transportation costs.

"Blended delivery", a mix of learning environments which includes learning mediated by communications and digital technologies, is increasingly being adopted in adult upgrading (AU) and literacy and basic skills (LBS) programs at Ontario's colleges of applied arts and technology. The College Sector Committee for Adult Upgrading (CSC) initiated the Blended Delivery: Moving Technology into the AU/LBS Classroom project to provide their Academic Upgrading managers and faculty resources and information to evaluate the merits of blended learning, or undertake blended learning, in an informed manner. The research included a literature review, surveys of teachers and students and a pilot project. They have published the literature review and the survey results.

In our last scan we reported that <u>NIACE</u> was coordinating the <u>Independent Inquiry into Adult and Youth literacy</u>. The initiative is in fact called the Inquiry into Adult Literacy in England. They have published a report on the current state of adult literacy in England after ten years of Skills for Life. While the report does not directly evaluate the Skills for Life government strategy, it finds that a lot of work remains to be done both in helping those adults with literacy difficulties and in preventing these problems from being passed down between generations.

The project summarized in this report aimed to help Windsor-Essex Ontario Works and the Tri-County Literacy Network to collaborate to better serve people living in poverty. It involved locating adult literacy projects related to poverty reduction in order to determine best practices, identifying relevant resources, getting literacy and basic skills (LBS) agencies to conduct self-assessments on the extent to which they used best practices, generating a strategic plan, and an evaluation of the project.
