The 2006 theme of the Blue Metropolis Montreal International Literary Festival — **City of Words** — can open doors into the physical realities of the cities we may inhabit or into the imaginary cities we construct in our minds.

A 21st-century view considers a more literal sense of the idea:

LED and LCD display texts intensify our image of the modern city as an electrical field. New technologies allow these letterforms to appear on almost any surface, from billboards to the windows and walls of buildings to the sides of buses and even clothing. The community writing and arts strand of Blue Metropolis proposes that writers and artists outside traditional literary sites speak to the same shared human experiences we seek in literature, and sometimes display a hidden brilliance waiting to be discovered. Nowhere is this more evident than among adults who are part of communities that have been silenced in the past — at-risk youth and adults who came to literacy only in adulthood. These are the readers and performers in the 2006 Grassroots: Community Writing and Arts session. We have asked them to think about the theme as they prepare their presentations, and hope that some of their creations will contribute to building our local city of words.

Who should attend?

Community-based groups working with at-risk youth, the homeless, and other marginalized groups; literacy educators/teachers interested in non-formal adult basic education and in attracting new learners; artists and community arts educators; teachers who want their students to gain an understanding of the power of literacy; professional writers and artists; social workers and community facilitators; members of the public and media interested in alternative forums and venues for learning.

Who will participate?

Writers, producers, coordinators, artists, and researchers who have linked literacy and the arts through creating, performing, writing and learning in community-based settings.
